Part A: Strategy Plan

Statement of Intent

Malpas Court Primary School is committed to supporting pupils eligible for the Pupil Development Grant (PDG) through a wide range of targeted intervention strategies. These interventions aim to address needs in literacy, numeracy, and wellbeing to ensure all pupils have the opportunity to achieve their full potential.

Literacy Support

Literacy interventions include catch-up programmes for pupils with Specific Learning Difficulties (SpLD), Precision Teaching, and the use of Nesy and Accelerated Reader to develop reading and spelling skills.

Numeracy Support

Numeracy support is delivered through targeted programmes such as Mathletics/ My Maths and Number Recovery, designed to strengthen core mathematical understanding.

Wellbeing Support

Wellbeing is prioritised through pastoral care delivered by trained Trauma Informed Schools practitioners, Thrive, and Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSAs). These approaches help pupils build resilience, self-esteem, and emotional regulation.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Senior leaders will rigorously monitor progress in key areas including phonics, reading, spelling, and mathematics. The effectiveness of all interventions will be tracked using EduKey to ensure impact and inform ongoing provision.

Family Engagement

The PDG will continue to fund our dedicated Family Engagement Officer, who plays a crucial role in supporting parents and carers. This includes signposting to external agencies, offering guidance on home learning strategies, and fostering strong home-school relationships built on trust and mutual respect. A variety of workshops and events will be organised to promote parental involvement and develop essential literacy and numeracy skills.

Intended Outcomes

PDG outcomes

IMPACT: 2024 – 2025

- THRIVE and ELSA sessions – all targeted learners made progress from their baseline. Improved levels of wellbeing and ‘readiness to learn’.
- Additional TA / small group support – raised standards in oracy, reading and maths
- HT and FEO – clear processes to improve attendance. Improved attendance for whole school with a marked improvement of number of persistent absentees.
- Incidents of positive handling reduced significantly from 2023 – 2024.
